he revenue wars are raging in East Lansing. After the city announced plans to impose an income tax on residents — including MSU students — the university retaliated.

MSU says it has legal control over — not just images of the Spartan mascot — but all things green and white. "We have a sliding scale of tax levies based on what folks in East Lansing wear and what they own," a spokesman said. "For instance: Wear a Sparty hat and you'll be billed \$5 a year."

The taxes go up from there. A well-manicured and fertilized lawn will be taxed \$300 during the "Green Season" and \$200-plus during the "White Season" — depending on snowfall amounts.

Not to be outdone in these Tax Wars, East Lansing officials plan to charge students a "sidewalk toll."

"All those feet, they create a lot of wear and tear on our sidewalks," said East Lansing Mayor Marco Pastures. "It's only fair to charge students a user fee."

While the fury on both sides of Grand River Avenue isn't likely to die down soon, the city and the university have agreed on one revenue-raising scheme: A \$25 fine for anyone wearing University of Michigan apparel, on the grounds that it's "inciting arrogance."

Music to our ears?

has developed in the long-delayed construction of a sound wall along U.S.127. The Michigan Department of Crumbling Roads says it is looking at an alternative to the wall, which was supposed to act as a sound barrier between the highway and residential neighborhoods.

The alternative? Sound. Lots and lots of sound. "We figure it's cheaper and faster just to mount some big loudspeakers, and let residents tune into whatever music fits their mood," said spokesman Maka Nosense. "So one neighborhood could opt for easy listening while one street over, they could groove on heavy metal. It's such an easy solution, we're surprised no one thought of this before."

The spokesman added that if residents reject the "Music Wall" plan, they can just sit back and wait for the sound wall to be finished. "We expect the wall project will be wrapped up in January of 2032." ■





Cool plans for Big Mac Walk

ue to traffic jams, security concerns and bureaucratic thumb-sucking, the Big Mac Bridge Authority is making more changes to the annual Labor Day Bridge Walk.

Beginning in 2018, the bridge walk will not take place on Labor Day. Instead, the walk will take place in mid-January, probably between midnight and 2 a.m.

"We think there will be less vehicular traffic at that time," said Big Mac spokesman Paydee Toll. "For that matter, we think there will be less pedestrian traffic at that time. Ideally, there will be a huge blizzard and high winds, so all cars and trucks will be prevented from crossing. That way, the bridge walkers will have the entire five-mile span to themselves. All three of them."

For those not inclined to do the bridge walk, the bridge authority plans to host several virtual walks where patrons can sit in a theater with their popcorn, put on 3-D glasses and experience the thrill of walking the Big Mac. Kinda sorta. ■

EAST LANSING: It's back to the future

lans for East Lansing's "Park District" project indicate a futuristic approach.

An architect's rendering includes special features for each apart-

ment – a heliport, a virtual-reality room and a recharging station for rocket packs. Also, the complex has a separate recreation den for robots.

"It won't really seem too advanced," a spokesman explained. "Past experience tells us that this will take a long time – a loooong time – to happen. By the time it's ready, this will feel contemporary."

The Park District project has been hit by a long string of delays. Deep in the city archives, researchers have discovered the first proposal; it included hitching posts, spittoons and a community room designated for "poker players and painted ladies."

Since then, various plans have been launched and withdrawn. "I'm sure this will be the one," the spokesman said. "It will happen ... but maybe not right away."

Build the wall — Here!

ansing developers have become frontrunners in the effort to design and build a border wall. The plan was jointly submitted by the Eyed and Jillepsie firms. "It was simple, really," a spokesman said. "We asked what would be most likely to appeal to President Grump."

In their plan, the wall will consist entirely of condos and apartments, upscale in style and in price. The apartments will go for \$1,199 a month or \$47.34 a month, depending on whether they face north or south.

Smiles to go before Smartones reach April






The Spartan basketball team is not disbanding and moving to Ann Arbor. Rather, the players are forming a disco band and will play on a stage that looks like an arbor.
